This came up in class: We learned in Palabras Nuevas the term “tener prisa” and found it to mean “to be in a hurry/rush.” Here is additional information about the **Mega Verb Tener** and some of its uses:

Tener:

"Tener" means "to have" in English. It's an irregular verb, so its conjugation doesn't follow standard patterns. Here's how it is conjugated in the present tense):

(yo) tengo

(tú) tienes

(él, ella, Usted) tiene

(nosotros/nosotras) tenemos

(ellos, ellas, Ustedes) tienen

Common Uses of "Tener"

1. To express possession:

- Tengo un coche. (*I have a car.*)
- Ellos tienen una casa grande. (*They have a big house.*)

2. To talk about age:

- ¿Cuántos años tienes? (*How old are you?*)
- Tengo 25 años. (*I am 25 years old.*)

3. To express certain physical or emotional states (tener + noun):

- Tengo hambre. (*I am hungry.*)
- Tenemos frío. (*We are cold.*)
- ¿Tienes sueño? (*Are you sleepy?*)

4. To express obligation (tener que + infinitive):

- Tengo que estudiar. (*I have to study.*)
- ¿Tienes que trabajar hoy? (*Do you have to work today?*)

5. **Idiomatic expressions:** "Tener" is used in many idiomatic phrases where English would use "to be." For example:

- Tener razón (*to be right*): Tienes razón. (*You are right.*)
- Tener prisa (*to be in a hurry*): Tenemos prisa. (*We are in a hurry.*)
- Tener cuidado (*to be careful*): Ten cuidado. (*Be careful.*)
